NEVADA SHERIFFS' & CHIEFS' ASSOCIATION OPPOSES LEGISLATION ON DRUG IMPORTATION

- **WHEREAS,** the number of unintentional overdose deaths from America's opioids crisis has drastically risen to an estimated 63,600 drug overdose deaths in 2016ⁱ; and
- **WHEREAS**, the number of opioid-related deaths from synthetic opioids was 19,413 in 2016ⁱⁱ, and the CDC has reported that the trend has extended into 2017, with more than 27,000 opioid overdose deaths involving synthetic opioids in 2017;ⁱⁱⁱ and
- WHEREAS, the number of opioid-related overdoses in Nevada was 408 in 2016; iv and
- **WHEREAS**, the DEA has seen a sharp increase in incidents of death and overdose from counterfeit prescription drugs containing fentanyl reaching the United States through Canada and Mexico; and
- **WHEREAS,** law enforcement throughout Nevada have seen fentanyl in counterfeit prescription opioid medications vi, vii, as well as cancer medicines with deadly results; viii and
- **WHEREAS**, even exposure to minimal amounts (approximately 2 -3 milligrams) of fentanyl can endanger the health and safety of law enforcement officers, their K-9 companions and other first responders, as the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has repeatedly warned and publicized; ix and
- **WHEREAS**, Nevada has seen an 56% increase in synthetic opioids, including fentanyl-related overdose deaths from 2015 to 2016; and
- **WHEREAS**, the rate of Emergency Room admissions due to an opioid increased by 136% and the rate of inpatient admissions rose by 84% from 2010-2016;^{xi} and

- WHEREAS, former FBI Director Louis Freeh concluded in his report that drug importation proposals would open the U.S. drug supply to illegitimate products, adulterated and counterfeit drugs; xii and
- WHEREAS, drug importation would worsen the opioid crisis, jeopardize the integrity and safety of the pharmaceutical supply chain in the United States, further burden law enforcement and endanger law enforcement officer and first responder safety; xiii and
- WHEREAS, the Nevada Sheriffs' & Chiefs' Association is concerned with the well-being of both law enforcement and citizens of Nevada;
- **WHEREAS**, the Nevada Sheriffs' & Chiefs' Association is concerned by the financial impact of opioid misuse in the state, including increasing emergency room visits and inpatient admissions; and
- WHEREAS, the Nevada Sheriffs' & Chiefs' Association is concerned about the safety of law enforcement officers, their K-9 companions and first responder personnel; and
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Nevada Sheriffs' & Chiefs' Association opposes the passage of legislative drug importation proposals, which if implemented, would worsen the opioid crisis, jeopardize law enforcement's ability to protect the public health, threaten the safety of our drug supply and endanger the safety of law enforcement officers, their K-9 companions and first responders across America.
