## CSTI Statement on [House Resolution XXX]

WASHINGTON – February 27, 2020 – In response to the introduction of a <u>House Resolution</u> today by Congressman Bob Latta (R-OH) that highlights the need for transparency online, the <u>Coalition for a Secure and Transparent Internet</u> (CSTI) issued the following statement:

We commend Rep. Bob Latta's ongoing commitment and leadership for keeping WHOIS data access open and accessible. WHOIS data is critical to keeping the internet a safe and secure place for all consumers.

WHOIS data is vital to law enforcement, consumer protection agencies, child advocacy groups, anti-human trafficking organizations, cybersecurity investigators, intellectual property rightsholders, journalists, academics and others. These stakeholders all rely on WHOIS to help them determine who is operating a criminal website, sending malicious (spam, phishing) emails, conducting cyber-attacks, influencing elections, propagating fake news or committing fraud under the guise of a known brand.

It is imperative that Congress act now to keeping the internet safe and transparent by removing restrictions on access to WHOIS data as a result of an over-broad interpretation of the E.U. General Data Protection Regulation.

CSTI encourages Congress to heed Rep. Latta's call and adopt federal legislation to protect the American public from online criminals.
